

Baccalaureate Degree Plan (BDP)
Associate in Arts (AA) to BA History, Secondary Education

The sequence below is contingent on completion of the AA degree from a college in the North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS). It represents one way in which the program of study can be completed. Following the BDP does not guarantee admission to UNCG or guarantee an AA or BA degree will be conferred. Students should seek academic advising to determine the best course of study to meet educational goals and degree requirements. [Refer to the University Admissions website for more information on admission and transfer of credits.](#) *NOTE: Credit will only be awarded for transferable courses for which a grade of C (2.0) or better is earned.*

Pages 1 and 2 reflect the suggested North Carolina Community College system category/course selection for the AA. Pages 3 and 4 reflect the academic plan of study, following completion of the AA and transfer to UNCG. This BDP is based upon full-time enrollment (12 or more hours) each semester.

The AA also requires an additional 14 SH of courses to be selected from courses classified as pre-major, electives, or general education courses within the CAA (ACA 122 is required)

*The Standard Professional I License in Secondary Social Studies requires [five select courses](#) from three of the following disciplines: Anthropology, Geography, Political Science, Psychology and Sociology. On the chart listed above, three have been recommended (SOC 101, PSY 150, and POL 120). Two others could include ANT 220 = UNCG ATY 113; ANT 240 = UNCG ATY 158; GEO 131 = UNCG GES 103 and 103L; GEO 111 = UNCG GES 104; GEO 112 = GES 105; PSY 230 = UNCG PSY 230; PSY 241 or 243 = UNCG PSY 250; PSY 237 = UNCG PSY 260.

If these courses are not completed as part of the AA, the UNCG course plan can be adjusted to include these courses.

The Bachelor of Arts in History requires a minimum of 120 semester hours (sh). UNCG requires a minimum 2.0 overall GPA for graduation. History majors must maintain a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.0 in history courses to qualify for a degree in History.

Within the College of Arts and Sciences, students are required to demonstrate intermediate-level proficiency in an additional language. The typical sequence of UNCG courses for language is 101, 102, 203, and 204. College of

Arts and Sciences considers successful completion of the 204 course a demonstration of proficiency. Students who transfer 60 or more credits to UNCG can satisfy this requirement by successfully completing a 102 course (equivalent of foreign language 112 at a NC Community College).
