Associate in Fine Arts (AFA) to BFA Studio Art – Painting Concentration

This is a suggested guide. Following the guide does not guarantee admission to UNCG or guarantee an AFA or BFA degree will be conferred. Students should seek academic advising to determine the best course of study to meet educational goals and degree requirements. In completing the AFA, in preparation of completing the BFA Studio Art - Painting Concentration, students should complete the listed courses.

Admittance to the B.F.A. program in Studio Art - Animation, New Media and Design, Painting, Photography, Printmaking and Drawing, or Sculpture and Ceramics, or the BFA in Art Education (K-12), is contingent upon successful review of a portfolio by a rotating committee of School of Art faculty.

The Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art – Painting concentration requires a minimum of 120 semester hours (sh). UNCG requires a minimum 2.0 overall GPA for graduation.



Admittance to the B.F.A. program in Art Education or in Studio Art – Animation, New Media and Design, Painting, Photography, Printmaking and Drawing, or Sculpture and Ceramics is contingent upon successful review of a portfolio by a rotating committee of School of Art faculty.

Transfer students are encouraged to apply as soon as they have fulfilled BFA portfolio requirements. Transfer students must complete the UNCG Studio Foundations coursework, or be enrolled in their final Foundations classes (generally ART 253 and/or ARH 112), and must apply as early as they are eligible to do so. Students who are not accepted through portfolio review may reapply in the following semester. Students may reapply once.
